The 2020 Safe Streets Summit is a collaborative effort between the Miami-Dade TPO, Broward MPO, and Palm Beach TPA, in partnership with the City of Fort Lauderdale, and coordinated with the assistance of Urban Health Partnerships.

WHAT ARE WE DOING?

Miami-Dade Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) *MiamiDadeTPO.org*

The Miami-Dade TPO is moving forward with the implementation of the Strategic Miami Area Rapid Transit (SMART) Plan. Since 2018, Locally Preferred Alternatives (LPA) have been adopted by the TPO Governing Board for the South Dade Transitway and North Corridors, and are expected for the Beach, East-West, Flagler, and Kendall Corridors in 2020. Major service openings included the SMART Bus Express Rapid Transit (BERT) “NW Miami-Dade Express” and the Miami Gardens Drive Park & Ride. In addition, the Miami-Dade TPO, in partnership with FDOT D6, Miami-Dade County, Citizens’ Independent Transportation Trust, and local municipalities, have coordinated the SMART Demonstration Program. Demonstration projects focus on increasing first and last mile access to existing and future SMART Plan transit stations. Also, the SMART Moves Program, through its Call for SMART Ideas and Municipal Program, is supporting the SMART Plan with projects in the areas of transit improvements, bicycle/pedestrian connections, self-driving vehicles, etc. Other recent accomplishments include the adoption of the 2045 LRTP and the successful Federal Cert Review resulting in the recertification of the Miami-Dade TPO through 2023.

Broward Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) *BrowardMPO.org*


The Broward MPO’s Complete Streets Initiative continues to make strides towards making Broward’s streets safer for all users. In February 2019, the MPO Board approved the Complete Streets Master Plan which developed a prioritized list of projects based on data-driven technical analysis, applied criteria, and local partner input. It incorporated community feedback gathered through a successful public outreach campaign. In November 2019, the MPO Board endorsed the Complete Streets Guidelines 2.0 which were updated to include innovative designs standards, best practices and local partner efforts. The MPO led a series of Walking Audits to gather feedback from community members. Information gathered will inform the scope of a future project. Additionally, the MPO conducted its first tactical urbanism demonstration as part of the “Let’s Go Walking to School!” event. The MPO continues with the implementation of its \$400 million investment in Complete Streets projects in Broward. The Broward MPO’s Urban Complete Streets demonstration project along Hollywood Blvd is nearing completion. It has been designed to improve the roadway safety of all users and enhance the economic vitality of the surrounding areas.

Palm Beach Transportation Planning Agency (TPA) *PalmBeachTPA.org*


The Palm Beach TPA continues to advance Complete Streets projects and initiatives that increase safety and encourage active transportation. In 2019, the TPA adopted its Long Range Transportation Plan 2045 update, which includes ambitious mode split goals, pedestrian and bicycle priority networks, and a “561 Plan” with 5 north-south and 6 east-west enhanced transit corridors in line with the TPA’s Vision of a safe, efficient, and connected multimodal transportation system. The LRTP update also created a State Road Modifications Program to allocate money annually to rebuilding state roads to be safer and more multimodal. In addition, the TPA adopted a Vision Zero Action Plan to develop a data-driven decision-making framework and create targeted countermeasures along with measurable action items to reduce fatalities and serious injuries. The TPA’s Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) includes approximately \$125 million for 50 projects over the next five years to substantially improve pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure. In addition, the TPA has prioritized approximately \$35 million for local transit projects.



Vice Mayor Robert McKinzie from the City of Fort Lauderdale will welcome participants to the 2020 Safe Streets Summit Mobile Workshop. The Mobile Workshop provides participants the opportunity to experience first-hand the type of infrastructure that has been built in Broward to create safer and more multi-modal streets. Each tour will highlight different parts of Broward emphasizing current and planned transportation and built environment efforts, walkability, bikeability, micromobility, economic development, livability, and access to transportation options. Local experts and community representatives will provide insight about a variety of projects and current efforts, focusing on outcomes and lessons learned.

Cruisin' the Beach - Fort Lauderdale A1A Bike Tour

The Cities of Fort Lauderdale and Lauderdale-By-The-Sea have been working to improve mobility through Complete Streets projects along SR A1A and Commercial Boulevard. The bike tour highlights one of the first urban greenways constructed in Broward. Partnerships included the cities, FDOT, and Broward MPO. This also included collaboration with Bike Walk FTL, Fort Lauderdale's bike/ped advocacy group.

Building Out a Complete Streets Network - Multi City Bike Tour

The bike ride highlights various on-street cycling infrastructure designs, the benefits of safe accommodations for bicyclists and pedestrians, and how these facilities result in economic development across Fort Lauderdale, Wilton Manors, and Oakland Park. Projects highlighted include: Fort Lauderdale's 13th Street and Dixie Highway; Wilton Manors' Wilton Drive "The Drive"; Oakland Park's growing Downtown and Culinary Arts District, Andrews Avenue, and Prospect Road.

The Flagler Village neighborhood in the City of Fort Lauderdale has an influx of dense, multifamily housing, significant adaptive reuse of formerly industrial spaces, and the arts which have resulted in one of the most dramatic urban changes in Fort Lauderdale. This e-scooter tour highlights recently completed and upcoming redevelopment projects and streetscape improvements that support multimodal transportation.

Downtown Fort Lauderdale on the Move: Enhancing Our Streets and Public Spaces - Water Trolley and Walking Tour

This walking tour highlights projects implemented from the Downtown Walkability Plan, which was developed by author and urbanist Jeff Speck in 2013. In this tour, you will experience the measures that have been implemented to enhance streetscapes for all users from both policy and implementation perspective.




