






Elements of a "Place" = Generalized Land Uses Kickoff meeting, May 2

 $Fiscal\ Responsibility - {\it Making sure your tax dollars are spent wisely by encouraging growth where we can provide the needed infrastructure.}$


Planning Ahead- Linking development and transportation decisions and ensuring an open and predictable planning process.



By modifying local municipalities zoning regulations, Broward county's communities will become more walkable, healthy and sustainable for the future of our County. The photos depict a "before and after" scenario of a typical auto-oriented corridor as a result of zoning policies that did not address smart growth principles.

- 1-Auto-oriented uses focus on vehicles only
- 2- Dominated design of the road is for cars
- 3- Narrow sidewalks, no physical barriers from vehicles
- 4- Blank walls, no pedestrian shelter





- 2- Bike lanes are required to help increase multi-modal transport.
- 3- On-street parking requirements aid in traffic calming and opportunities to park and walk to a variety of services.
 4-Landscaping standards provide aesthetics and safety for the

- 5- Wider sidewalks provide opportunities for exchange with other people.
- 6- Transparent windows, awnings, and active retail encourage walking a street.

Overview

The Smart Growth Partnership, through a grant provided by TOUCH, evaluated a the City of West Park's Code of Ordinances. The evaluations provided identify the rules and regulations in your community that support or block smart growth. It will also show the gaps in the regulations where a lack of standards may be hindering smart growth development. We requested the City's Engineering manual to evaluate the street standards, however, to date, we were not given the manual. If provided, we can update this audit. There are highlighted excel frames, and some questions, once you have a chance to review, we can arrange a conference call or a meeting at your convenience.



"Elements of an Ideal CS Policy"

- 1. Sets a vision.
- 2. Includes all modes.
- 3. Applies to both new and retrofit projects.
- 4. Emphasizes connectivity.
- 5. Applies to all phases of all applicable projects.
- 6. Specifies and limits exceptions, with management approval required.
- 7. Uses latest design guidelines, is flexible.
- 8. Is context-sensitive.
- 9. Sets performance standards.
- 10. Includes implementation steps.

Pros and Cons of Various Policies

Policy Type	Pros	Cons
City Council Resolution	Quick and easy, sets the vision.	 Not comprehensive, may lack specificity and leave priorities, standards, and procedures and performance measures unchanged.
City Council Policy	Can include most of the elements of an ideal policy.	 Possibly involves more steps, requiring longer preparation. Not integrated with other policies with which it may conflict.
Ordinance	 Implements the vision and provides specific standards and procedures; has the force of law. 	More steps, requiring longer preparation.May not have adequate policy support.
Internal Policy	 Quicker implementation. Required buy-in from affected agencies provides education opportunity across departments and disciplines. 	 Not necessarily anchored in official policy. May lack accountability mechanism such as performance measures and regular reports.
General Plan Policy	 Ideal policy vehicle for creating a Complete Streets policy and exceptions to Level of Service. The GP is the jurisdiction's "constitution". All other policies, zoning, and regulations must be consistent with the GP. 	 General plan amendments can require a lengthy process. Must be followed up with specific implementation steps.


